Like many public service organizations in the “Time of COVID”, collective resolve and endurance saw us through a third year of unique challenges. NVDPL staff persisted throughout, making an impact on the people in our community and achieving new heights of accomplishment.

We proudly introduced a brand-new service model at our Lions Gate Express Library, enhancing accessibility and convenience for our patrons in the Lower Capilano area.

Our commitment to providing high-quality resources led to the development and launch of non-traditional collections, including Caring Community Resource Kits, First Language Storytime Kits, CO₂ Monitor Kits, and Puppet Kits. We played a leading role in cataloging efforts for the 2022 North Shore Authors Collection, supporting over 90 local authors and co-hosting a successful launch event.

Our commitment to inclusivity was showcased through educational displays and events like in-person Drag Queen Storytime, promoting self-love and diversity. And to better serve all members of our community, we introduced Access Cards to ensure individuals without a fixed address can enjoy library services.

We nurtured a love of reading and lifelong learning in our community, reaching back to 95% of pre-pandemic collection usage levels. And we continued to engage and uplift our community,

hosting three Summer Reading Club celebration ceremonies and offering over 50 opportunities to support creativity.

None of this would be possible without solid supports and partnerships. We’re grateful to the District of North Vancouver for their continued collaboration and financial support, as well as to the Province of BC and Friends of the NVDPL for additional funding support. We extend sincere thanks to the many library volunteers, specially the Library Board and Friends, for contributing your time and expertise so generously.

Finally, to our amazing staff: thank you. Your work, both visible and behind the scenes, has a profound impact on the lives of those who walk through our doors or connect with us online. Thank you for opening doors for people to explore new worlds and creating spaces where our community finds connection and inspiration. Your passion for library service makes the NVDPL such a treasured community resource.

Building Bridges and Breaking Down Barriers

In 2022, we introduced the Open Door Community Hub at NVDPL, a drop-in space for people to gather and connect with other members of the community. The program helps break down barriers and foster a sense of community by providing a welcoming haven, especially for individuals facing homelessness. Our staff create warm and friendly spaces where participants make connections in a relaxed and informal setting, promoting a sense of belonging. Attendees appreciate the opportunities for connection-building and fun, as well as the opportunity to receive essential care kits, snacks, and refreshments.

This Open Door Community Hub is supported by the BC Strengthening Communities Grant, in collaboration with the District of North Vancouver and the North Shore Homelessness Task Force. Together, we are building bridges and making a lasting impact on the lives of community members, demonstrating the transformative power of libraries as hubs for positive change.

Speed Candi-Dating with Council

Ahead of the District of North Vancouver's municipal election, the Library hosted its first ever Speed Candi-Dating event. The program was designed to give prospective voters the opportunity to get to know aspiring Council members and School Board Trustees in a personal, informal, and connected way by meeting alone or in small groups. The event was sold out at 60+ attendees and folks had just 2 minutes and 30 seconds to cram in their questions to help them confirm who they most aligned with. We heard great feedback from attendees that the event helped them make choices on who to place their votes. It was great way to contribute to achieving the goal of facilitating community dialogue and promoting citizenship and engagement.

Sharing is Caring

At the heart of our mission is a commitment to providing equitable access to resources and technologies that might otherwise be beyond the reach of our community. 2022 marked a significant leap forward for NVDPL's collection of non-traditional offerings with the introduction of Puppet Kits, CO₂ Monitors, board games, and more.

The introduction of Puppet Kits, which are curated bags of a book accompanied by a puppet, was a resounding success with 78 kits borrowed over 400 times in their first three months. Beyond their adorable appeal, the kits empower patrons to develop crucial literacy skills at home all while bringing stories to life in a delightfully engaging way.

Furthering our commitment to health literacy, NVDPL proudly became one of the first two libraries in BC to unveil its collection of CO₂ monitor kits. The tool provides users with immediate insights into indoor air quality, helping them make informed choices about their health and the indoor spaces they visit. The rapid popularity of these monitors, with over 300



holds in the first month, led us to triple our offerings to keep up with the surging demand!

Our new First Language Storytime Kits are early-literacy resources that support patrons engaging with materials in world languages, including Spanish, Chinese, Tagalog, Korean, French, and Persian. Each kit contains books, puppets, and a guidebook of activities, songs and rhymes, making it easy to build connections with books in any language. Offering non-traditional resources supports our commitment to reaching new audiences and offering collections that unite our community in shared learning.

In anticipation of the holidays and the winter school break, NVDPL launched its initial collection of board games. The new board games offer up an affordable and accessible way to enjoy varied game collections, build connections, and have fun.



By eliminating financial barriers and encouraging risk-free exploration to new items, our library is fostering community learning, information sharing, and connection-building in ways that align with the evolving needs of our community. It will always be our goal to support a wide range of community interests, and help our community to learn, discover, create and collaborate in the ways that are important to them!

Community Creations & Connections

Libraries are not just places for consumption of content—they are places for creation! In 2022, NVDPL hosted 50 opportunities for creation, imagination, and play. From coding programs for kids to NaNoWriMo Write-ins for teens and adults, these free programs promote artistic and creative expression in community members of all ages.

Our Virtual Tween Art Club offered kids aged 8-12 a chance to meet fellow tween artists, share their creations, and learn together. Guest presenters imparted invaluable skills in storyboarding, video game design, doodling, and more. At our Beginner and Beyond Comic Making Workshop, catering to participants aged 10 to 60, attendees delved into the fundamentals of comic creation with the guidance of cartoonist Kathleen Gros, learning about inking and coloring techniques and character building, empowering attendees to craft their own unique comics.



By championing creative programs, the library can help inspire creativity, build connections, and support the potential of budding creatives in our community.

Introducing the NVDPL Express Library

NVDPL's Express Library, an innovative and unique model for library service, opened in 2022 at the brand-new Lions Gate Community Recreation Centre. The new NVDPL location is situated in the heart of Lions Gate Village, a growing new community, and is offered in partnership with North Vancouver Recreation and Culture and Capilano Community Services.



The boutique library is the first model of its kind in British Columbia, offering a curated collection of the latest materials, a cozy reading area, friendly staff, and a state-of-the-art Holds Pick Up Locker which allows for convenient library pick-ups anytime the recreation centre is open.

The new NVDPL presence will help expand the library's reach on the North Shore, offering more convenient service to previously underserved areas, all while supporting the building of vibrant and bustling town centres.
