# Message from the Mayor

The North Vancouver District Public Library continues to be an integral resource within the District, helping us build a thriving, connected, and engaged community.

As our libraries continue to evolve into hubs of learning and innovation, this annual report highlights some of the notable achievements of our public library system throughout the year.

In 2023, Library staff welcomed over 1.3 million visitors and answered over 128,000 questions. The library continues to provide equitable access to high-quality resources, with over 1.8 million items lent out that year.

As part of the library's commitment to developing and launching unique collections, the variety of items available for lending has expanded to include puzzles and board games, eReaders, caring community resource kits, first language storytime kits, radon kits, CO<sub>2</sub> monitoring kits, and more.

I am proud to report that the North Van District public library system is ranked second among all British Columbia libraries for circulation per capita, with residents borrowing an average of 20 items per year.

Beyond lending materials, our libraries provide welcoming spaces where we can all get access to essential tools like Wi-Fi, computers, and quiet areas for study and collaboration. Our libraries continue to be a place where we can come together with our neighbours to share, learn, and connect.

The library also plays a crucial role in fostering a lifelong love of learning. Programs like the Summer Reading Club, which is one of my favourite programs, ignite a passion for reading among our youngest residents, helping to build a foundation of curiosity and literacy that carries into adulthood.

On behalf of the District of North Vancouver Council and residents, I would like to extend my sincere gratitude to the NVDPL Board, leadership team, staff, and volunteers.

The team's dedication to providing exceptional library services that support the social well-being of those of us who live here is truly admirable. We look forward to another exciting year of learning, innovation, and deeper community connections.

In many ways, 2023 felt like a return to connection and celebration. It was also a year of evolution, reminding us of the special role libraries play in our lives: they grow with us and adapt to inspire and support every stage and phase of life.

As we emerge stronger from a few collectively challenging years, we're proud to reflect on another great year of public library service. Demand for library services in North Vancouver remains strong, with circulation reaching a 10-year high in 2023.

We launched more community-focused collections, including French Caring Community Kits and Chromebook laptops. With over 1,700 non-traditional items available, including puzzles, e-readers, board games, and more, we're proud to offer more ways for people to access resources that enrich their lives.

Bringing people together has always been at the heart of what we do. In 2023, we hosted 1,250 programs with 25,664 attendees. We co-hosted the first in-person North Shore Writers Festival since 2019 at West Vancouver Memorial Library, welcoming over 500 attendees to celebrate the power of stories. We were also recognized with four PRXchange Awards from the American Library Association.

The Library Board launched an extensive strategic planning process to ensure we continue meeting

the needs of our growing community. By gathering input from Library Trustees, staff, and the public, we are shaping a refreshed vision for 2024.

We're grateful to the District of North Vancouver for their continued collaboration and financial support, and to the Province of BC for additional funding that extends our reach and impact. We're also thankful for the Friends of the Library, who generously give their time to raise funds for special initiatives.

Our libraries have always been more than our buildings and books—it's the lovely humans who create amazing library experiences that make them so special. To our staff, thank you for the passion and commitment you bring to work each day. Whether you're assisting a curious reader, creating a new program, or working behind the scenes, your efforts have a lasting impact on every visitor.

We look forward to another year of inspiration, connection, and sharing in the year ahead.

#### **Outreach in Action**

Library outreach goes beyond promoting services—it builds a culture of lifelong learning and belonging. Bringing the library into the community helps break down barriers and meet people where they are, creating impactful connections to library services. In 2023, NVDPL's Youth Services Teams exceptional outreach efforts created thousands of meaningful touchpoints, surging past pre-2020 levels.

Highlights include over 35 visits to local schools, over 10 visits to Tsleil-Waututh Nation School and the Xwemélch'stn Etsimxwawtxw Capilano Little Ones School, 2 Ready, Set, Learn events at the North Vancouver School District, 4 Fun in the Sun programs, a special Fresh Air Learning for World Bee Day at Loutet Farm, and participation in community celebrations like Highland Little League's Opening Day, Dorothy Lynas School's Summer BBQ, Lynn Valley Day Parade and Fair, Blueridge Good Neighbour Day, and more!

This outreach in action demonstrates the power of outreach to spark curiosity, create and strengthen relationships, and encourage



learning in unique ways—through these efforts, NVDPL reached over 7,300 connections.

Here's to more opportunities for our libraries to come alive beyond our physical walls, bringing joy, enrichment, and essential library services to our community.

# Open Doors to Connection and Care

NVDPL has been running the Open Door Community Hub since 2022, with funding from the BC Strengthening Communities grant and SPARC BC. The vital program creates a welcoming space where all community members—particularly those experiencing homelessness—can gather, access care kits, enjoy refreshments, and connect with others in a relaxed and supportive environment. The program serves as a bridge for fostering relationships and strengthening connections at Parkgate and Lynn Valley Library.

Library staff play a key role by hosting engaging group activities such as word games, discussions, and puzzles, while also providing access to resources and guidance on accessing services like housing and mental health support. They also assist with library services like signing up for a library card and using onsite technology.

By fostering a sense of belonging and providing accessible spaces where people are free to be themselves, library staff are making a meaningful difference in the lives of community members and promoting a stronger, more inclusive community.

# **Brews & Books: Sharing Stories in Unexpected Places**

After a three-year hiatus, we were delighted to bring back our Brews & Book series, now in partnership with North Vancouver City Library and West Vancouver Memorial Library. This North Shore-wide series took our libraries beyond our walls, transforming four local breweries and restaurants into vibrant spaces for storytelling and connection.



120 bibliophiles and brew enthusiasts enjoyed events all summer long, which highlighted the work of four talented local authors:

Jayne Seagrave, Colin Stein, Cathalynn Labonté-Smith and Renée Sarojini Saklikar. Each event explored a different topic, from camping in British Columbia and cycling advocacy to rescue operations and fantasy storytelling.

By bringing our libraries into the hearts of our community, we have the opportunity to highlight local businesses and reinforce our commitment to lifelong learning—wherever people gather.

# The Fire Still Burns: An Evening with Sam George

As part of our ongoing work to support Truth and Reconciliation, we were honoured to host an event featuring Sam George, a Squamish Elder, residential school survivor, and author of the memoir *The Fire Still Burns: Life In and After Residential School*, in collaboration with North Shore libraries. A full room of attendees listened to Sam share the dark history and truths of his time in residential schools with open hearts and open minds. Despite the painful subject matter, it was a poignant and uplifting event for all who attended.



The evening of learning and reflection included a heartfelt discussion where Sam shared his life experiences and process of writing the book, and included a portion outlining how the memoir stemmed from an oral history project guided by Jill Goldberg and Langara students Liam Belson, Dylan MacPhee, and Tanis Wilson.

The event included a warm Traditional Welcome led by Chepx\_imiya Siyam' Chief Janice George, who shared Squamish Nation teachings on the cultural significance of notable places across the North Shore and Vancouver.

Guests also enjoyed Bannock, a traditional

fry bread, from Lisa Lewis, and 32 Books was on hand to sell copies of Sam's book.

Events like these bring us closer together as a community, allowing us to listen, learn and unlearn, and discover new ways to support truth, reconciliation, and decolonization.

I love coming with my son for events, and also just to be surrounded by books and choose different adventures together.

# Digitizing Histories: Connecting our Past, Present & Future

In 2023, NVDPL took strides to support preservation and celebrate the rich history of our collective history and personal stories.

The North Shore Digital Libraries project launched, providing free and open access to the stories that shaped our community. The unique collection of digitized North Shore newspapers, from 1976-2000, ensures that past, present, and future generations can access the stories, events, and memories that defined our community's history. The initiative was launched in partnership with North Vancouver City Library and West Vancouver Memorial Library, with support from the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre at UBC.

In another collaboration, Tsleil-Waututh Nation speakers utilized StoryLab's resources to record the Hul'q'umi'num' names of local animals in our Audio Booth. These recordings are now part of North Van Arts' interactive online map, the North Shore Culture Compass, contributing to the preservation and celebration of local Indigenous language.



StoryLab is also helping bridge the gaps for beginners and paving the way for new users to explore their creative and digitization projects through innovative partnerships, workshops, and educational programming. The new Digitization Station empowers patrons to preserve cherished personal memories by digitizing materials, including converting old VHS tapes into digital formats. As new technologies and formats emerge, the new service plays a role in helping our community carry their personal memories into future generations.

These new initiatives highlight the power of using digital literacy skills to preserve our history!

# Literacy Pathways: A Pokémon Adventure at NVDPL

NVDPL was abuzz during spring break thanks to a wildly successful Pokémon Scavenger Hunt that inspired over 1,200 kids to participate across three branches. Participants searched for Pokémon hidden in the stacks and collected badges, all while engaging with literary content they love, just like the characters in the books and TV show. Kids displayed their badges with great pride and many enthusiastic children even came adorned in their favourite PokéGear.



1793 total buttons were handed out, and over 300 children visited all three locations to receive all three badges. 120 children also visited Lions Gate Express Library to receive a special bonus sticker.

Staff were able to create memorable and special moments for young community members to engage with the library and explore the library, all while using their imagination and skills to locate characters!


