In 2020, the North Vancouver District Public Library skillfully adapted to the pandemic reality by offering new services, programs and safety protocols so it could continue offering our community a place to connect, share and be inspired.

When COVD-19 forced libraries to close their doors, librarians hosted virtual sessions to teach District residents about all the digital resources and content offered by the NVDPL, from ebooks and e-magazines to free e-learning platforms.

Book clubs and other library programs and events also went virtual, so anyone with a library card could continue learning and engaging from the comfort of their own homes and stay connected during a time when many felt isolated. Later, NVDPL launched a takeout service for those who preferred physical books and materials.

I am incredibly proud of the expanded access and innovative programming our libraries offered to meet the varied needs of our community members during a tough time.

Our public libraries are community hubs that offer free and equitable access to a diverse collection of high-quality materials to borrow—both in-person and online—and a variety of other important resources, like Wi-Fi and computer stations. Despite the COVID-19-related challenges in 2020, the NVDPL's core values of accessibility, diversity and sustainability remained at the forefront. We learned that the value of our libraries transcends the books on their shelves.

On behalf of Council and the District of North Vancouver, I would like to express my gratitude to the NVDPL Board, leadership team and staff for their unwavering dedication to nurturing the intellectual and social health of District of North Vancouver residents during a particularly challenging year.

2020 impacted and challenged our community in ways that were out of our realm of comprehension prior to March 2020. Despite this, North Vancouver District Public Library leaned into our vision of inspiring learning, discovery, creativity and collaboration in our community.

As fear and uncertainty about the pandemic accelerated in March, NVDPL staff courageously, safely and rapidly shifted how we deliver core services to support our community. We created NVDPL from Home and invested in digital resources. We preserved community learning and connection with innovative virtual programs, and we kept patrons smiling with lighthearted "window librarianship". We collaborated with our local network to offer services to our community's most vulnerable and provided access to technology. We're proud to say we were one of the first libraries in the country to creatively develop Library Takeout, a 'curbside' model of library service—all while ensuring the health and safety of our staff and community.

We also launched NVDPL's 2020-2023 Strategic Plan, reaffirming our commitment to addressing social inequity and racism, and unveiling a refreshed brand to better reflect the vibrancy and essence of the everevolving role we play in our community. In 2020, getting stories into the hands of readers and providing access to resources and information had never been more crucial—and it simply would not have been possible without the support of a strong network of contributors.

We're particularly grateful for the support and leadership from the District of North Vancouver and NVDPL Trustees. We are thankful to the Province of British Columbia, the Friends of the Library, TELUS, and the West Vancouver Foundation's Emergency Community Support Fund for additional financial support. We'd also thank our community for rallying behind your library and supporting us through a challenging year.

We kept up the correspondence throughout the pandemic, and while I don't pick her books anymore like I did during our closure, we continue to write to each other! My letters get tucked away into one of her hold books and her letters are returned via the book drop! It's pretty darn magical."














Community Comments

Connect.



Library Takeout

We know books can lift our spirits, provide refuge, and connect us in difficult times, but in the early stages of the pandemic, when digital resource use soared, there were many people cut off from critical access to physical materials. Our staff proactively developed a brand new service model: Library Takeout. NVDPL's expert staff pulled requests and selected materials, packaged them up, and then provided a safe pickup time for a contactless experience.

As one of the first libraries in Canada to develop a takeout model of service, the demand was overwhelming and the response was heartening. In the first week alone, the Library safely delivered thousands of items and fulfilled nearly 1,000 orders!

At a time when people were encouraged to stay home, Library Takeout at NVDPL gave our community somewhere to go by diving into the pages of a book!



Window Librarianship

The library doors may have closed on March 17, 2020, but there was still so much goodness happening behind-the-scenes. When anxiety and fear were growing, NVDPL librarians took it upon themselves to make sure our community was smiling with Window Librarianship. Windows turned into places where people could find book recommendations, take a peek at what hijinks our stuffed animal friends were getting up to, or take part in physical literacy activities. Even through glass, NVDPL staff found ways to connect with our community.

Serving Seniors

Even as a coronavirus outbreak took place in our community, NVDPL staff remained committed to supporting Home Library Service and Talking Books patrons. By checking in with care homes and individuals who we regularly delivered to, NVDPL adapted procedures to ensure our community's most isolated and vulnerable patrons had access to the content they relied on for entertainment and mental health purposes.

NVDPL Takeout during the lockdown was a god-send!

NVDPL from Home

Following a total Library closure in March, NVDPL shifted its services to help serve our community by offering assistance online and through phone service. By providing vital access to digital services, members of our communities had uninterrupted access to a vast collection of ebooks, e-audiobooks, e-magazines and e-newspapers, movies, learning resources, and so much more. Digital resource use in 2020 soared, resulting in a 70% increase of engagement with online resources.





Going Virtual

When facilities closed, the way our community interacts, connects, and engages with one another changed too. NVDPL retooled programming to be offered virtually in order to sustain and meet demand for programs while our community stayed closer to home. From online trivia nights, to social media storytime, to a virtual petting zoo, patrons had fun and friendly ways to connect with each other from afar.

Learning and Unlearning

As part of our collective reconciliation journeys and inspired by the work of Bob Joseph, author of "21 Things You Didn't Know About the Indian Act", the three North Shore library systems provided a virtual opportunity to share in civic learning—and unlearning—about Indigenous perspectives and experiences. Bob Joseph, member of the Gwawaenuk Nation, author, and founder of Indigenous Corporate Training Inc., thoughtfully presented complex Indigenous issues and demonstrated why learning about the Indian Act's cruel, enduring legacy is essential for us to move forward with reconciliation, 330 attendees took part in this learning, which was followed by a meaningful discussion with Alexander Dirksen of Métis Nation BC. Library staff and trustees were also invited to attend Indigenous awareness training to further build a foundation of understanding as North Shore libraries continue work to centre and highlight Indigenous voices.

Take Home Technology

When North Shore libraries closed their doors to the public, most services, from device help to events and programs, moved online. For those without access to technology, there were people who were instantly cut off from important services and social interactions.

Spearheaded by staff at West Vancouver Memorial Library, the three North Shore libraries received a donation of phones and tablets from TELUS that the libraries distributed through local community agencies to those in need. Library staff provided ongoing user support online and by phone, along with access to a wide array of free downloadable books, movies, music, and classes. This important initiative helped combat isolation by connecting people with friends, family, and library and government resources.

The provision of reading and watching material has been very important during the pandemic. Thank you for making it possible for us to keep borrowing in these challenging times.



Building Better Communities

Together with Librarian Paul Taylor, NVDPL was honoured with the British Columbia Library Association's Building Better Communities Award in 2020. The award recognizes recipients for efforts to increase the relevancy and impact of library service through partnership, collaboration, and building trust where little had previously existed.

NVDPL and Paul Taylor curated a unique series of community learning programs called MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses). During a time when many social issues and crises are gaining significance and, at times, becoming divisive, Paul Taylor and the library created safe spaces to discuss contentious topics or share new ideas that helped combat isolation and build a sense of community for patrons of all walks of life.
