
*On July 16, 1971, twelve rounds of .22 calibre bullets were fired into the Lynn Valley Library by a patron. Luckily, only a few books were damaged! Read more about it in our history book: Fifty! With a Fabulous Future by Dave Obee.

In the early 1950s, a small group of women in Capilano Highlands came up with a plan to get a book service. As they admitted later, they didn't know much about what they were doing—but they made up for that lack of knowledge with determination and dedication.

The little library they created in a private home grew quickly, moved first to another home, then to spare shelves in a store, to a portable shack, to a spare room in a new fire hall and then into a dedicated building—all in less than nine years.

In 1964, their Capilano community library formed the basis for the North Vancouver District Library. Today's thriving institution owes its start to the women who volunteered their time to make the District a better place—and who inspired a level of library service that continues to this day.

Connecting with the community

Launching NNELS

When the Library launched a new website in July 2014, we also introduced the National Network for Equitable Library Service (NNELS) to our community through our updated Digital Services and Home Librarians. We're proud to offer this to our patrons who are not able read traditional print resources!

Working With North Shore Newcomers

In spring 2014 the Library welcomed Library Champions to the District. This New-to-BC initiative provided the Library with the unique opportunity to work with, and learn from, newcomers who underwent training and development to become strong advocates of the Library in the community.

We also started a series of Community Conversations for newcomers, helping newcomers engage in a conversation that is purposefully formatted to elicit the needs and aspirations of the participants.

We are already hearing that our awareness and efforts are making a difference in the lives of our community members and new families to North Vancouver.

Edcamp 2014

Working with the North Vancouver School District #44, we held an Edcamp on issues regarding social media and technology! The Library was filled with students, teachers, staff, and community members who came out to participate. The Library spaces came alive with conversation, the sharing of ideas, and the community creation of knowledge. It was fantastic!



Summer Reading Club 2014: Funny Business!

We had large turn-outs for the annual Summer Reading Club. The theme was Funny Business! and our libraries were filled with jokes, giggle-filled programming, and children asking us for more books. We also had a Teen Summer Reading Club and an Adult Summer Reading Club! This community loves to read and we love being here to support and celebrate this important element of the good life here in the District.

These are just a few of the highlights of how we like to connect with our community members. We also participated in Culture Days, hosted a Poetry Flash Mob at each of the Library's locations with readings of "The Canoe he called Loo Taas," spent time with students and teachers from Xwemelch'stn Etsímxwawtxw Capilano Little Ones School and Tsleil-Waututh Child and Family Development Centre, ran "Start Grade 8 with a Clean Slate", a fee amnesty initiative with the goal of having all grade 8 students begin high school with a working library card, and more!

In the digital world

What a year in support of the Library's new Strategic Framework! We **launched a new website** with a responsive and modern design, increased our digital literacy training, and experimented with innovative programs. Here's a snapshot of our 2014 tech accomplishments!

- Expanded one-on-one technology assistance with NVDPL staff, as well as established a Tech Tutors program, which pairs teen volunteers with those seeking to become more tech savvy.
- Brought our digital expertise into the community, partnering with Lionsview Seniors' Planning Society. We now offer digital literacy workshops for Farsi-speaking seniors.
- Strengthened our programs on educating the community about how to access our growing digital collections, like ebooks on Library2Go; magazines on Zinio; digital movies; and TV shows, music and audiobooks on Hoopla our newest digital streaming service!

- Experimented with programs that support
 the creation of knowledge and develop
 digital literacy skills, like a workshop series on
 building your own website and information
 sessions on how to take photos with personal
 electronic devices.
- Offered free access to world-class technology, entertainment and design talks as we livestreamed the 2014 TED conference in the Library.
- Teamed up with the District of North Vancouver to host DataCamp, a one-day conference exploring open data. The open data movement promotes the sharing of data to increase transparency, improve decisionmaking, and spark innovation. The dynamic conversations that took place were a vivid example of the Library serving as a space where communities come together, work on ideas, and experiment!
- Deepened our in-house technology skills, launching a brand new website with improved navigation, a modern look and feel, and a mobile friendly layout that is responsive to all devices. This website was designed entirely with the expertise of our own staff! The result was an amazing collaborative effort across the organization, and a more engaging and responsive website for patrons.
